THE CROSS MAKES A CRUCIAL DIFFERENCE!

John Truscott, who does a lot of work advising churches over many organisational and administrative matters, was called upon by a number of people to advise concerning giving. The conclusion he came to, slightly unexpectedly, was that **where the Cross was preached people gave much more generously**. In recent times the main thrust of teaching about giving has been that we are stewards of God's resources and ought to make the best use of them. John found that this message only went so far.

But when people began to realise just what Jesus had done for them upon the cross, that He died to pay the price of all our wrongdoing and

make it possible for us to be reconnected with God, people were moved with such a sense of gratitude that they gave generously, a tenth or more being the norm. What we believe about the cross is not simply some academic exercise to see which theology we might choose! **It is the foundation of how we live**. Bonhoeffer reckoned that failure to understand this meant

the church was weak in facing the rise of Nazism – it did not take sin and grace seriously and so was not willing to make the sacrifice necessary to stand up and be counted.

If Jesus died so that we might be forgiven, have a fresh start, take all the dross of our lives etc. in exchange for His blessing, then we will want to respond by denying ourselves; taking up *our* cross to follow Him. We deserved nothing except to pay for the consequences of our sin, but Jesus bore that for us so we can receive what we do not deserve, namely His blessing. **That is the divine exchange of the cross:**

He was *punished* that we might be *forgiven* (Eph. 1:7)

He *bore our sin* that we might *receive His righteousness* (2 Cor. 5:21).

He *died our death* that we might *have His life* (Rom. 6:23)

He *bore our wounds* that we might *be healed* Isa. 53:4; Matt. 8:16-17).

He was *cut off from the Father* that we might be *joined to the Father* (Matt.27: 46-)

He became *poor* that we might become *rich* (2 Cor. 8:9)

He *bore our shame* that we might *share His glory* (Ps. 69:7).

As John Stott wrote: *“The essence of sin is we human beings*

substituting ourselves for God, while the essence of salvation is God substituting Himself for us. We... put ourselves where only God deserves to be...he puts Himself where we deserve to be".

Jesus' resurrection is the guarantee that, because Jesus has died for us, we can look forwards to entering the fullness of all that Jesus won for us, when He returns. **Good News indeed!**

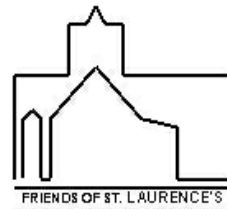

MEDITATION FOR HOLY WEEK

This meditation has been adapted from the Church Army's Prayer Diary for Holy Week. It invites us to pray for Christian Ministry through the eyes of the people who were in Jerusalem that first Easter.

Caiaphas

Caiaphas believed the end justified the means and undermined the purposes of the very God he thought he was serving. Father, give your servants the integrity to follow your commandments wholeheartedly, even when it is inconvenient.

Simon Peter

Peter lost his nerve when he was in danger, but at least he was there. Lord God, be with your servants who go with your gospel into places of danger. Give them courage to proclaim your goodness and love.

Judas

Judas lost the plot, thought he knew better than Jesus, and was too proud to repent when the awful truth dawned on him. May God give us grace to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus and the humility to live a life of ongoing repentance.

Jesus

"Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing," said

Jesus as he was crucified. We pray that all your ministers would remain focused on being messengers of the good news of forgiveness.

The centurion

"Truly this man was the Son of God!" The centurion knew God's truth when he saw it, even though it was completely alien to his culture. We pray for the 40% of people in the UK and Ireland who have effectively no knowledge of Jesus.

Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea

These men were compromised and bullied into being part of actions with which they disagreed profoundly, but they did what they could and dissociated themselves from those decisions. Be with all of us when we struggle to reconcile what we believe with the murky compromises of real life, and help us to take a stand for what is right.

Mary Magdalene

Mary's heart was in the right place and it took her feet to the right place on Sunday morning, where she met with the risen Christ. May our hearts always take us to the place of God's choosing, where we will meet with him.

NANCY'S PAPERWORK ENDS

Our Cornish born and bred Curate, Nancy Cleaton, has finally said goodbye to the Parish Office after twenty years of paper work and helping four Rectors to settle into the parish.

It was at the beginning of the 90's that Nancy joined Norma Brewer in the office and then for just two days a week. But to really know Nancy we need to go back to her childhood. She was brought up as a member of the Plymouth Brethren - a strict fellowship where women did not speak in church!

Despite this strict upbringing Nancy always wanted "to do some sort of Christian work" so she studied at the London School of Theology and took a Bachelor of Divinity degree at London University.

It was whilst at college that Nancy met her husband, Adrian, and after spells in Turners Hill and Eastleigh, where Adrian was in the Free Church ministry, they moved to Church Stretton when Adrian was appointed Director of Music at St Laurence's in 1990.

Nancy has never been one for 'doing nothing' and in Turners Hill she not only started a pre-school play group but also worked at an Approved School for Girls that was run by the Salvation Army. On their

move to Hampshire Nancy became Administrator at a big church in Above Bar, Southampton.

Despite a somewhat hectic lifestyle Nancy still found time to have two children – Simon and Jane.

Following the breakdown of her marriage it took time for Nancy to 'find her feet again', and it was at the urging of her friends at St Laurence's that she started studying in 1999 to be a Reader. Throughout her three year training she never thought of training for ordination.



After being a Reader for a while she found she wanted the sacramental dimension that only ordination can provide: she wanted to be able to officiate at weddings and baptisms. And so the road to ordination was begun and, as the saying goes, the rest is history.

FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

8th Day is a parish group, aiding us to think and to seek Jesus' discernment regarding our care of creation.

Our recent meeting focused on food and we talked around various issues in depth.

One particular concern was that many people today are largely detached from awareness of seasonal food. Unless people are used to growing their own food, or having a close friend or family member growing their own, it can be hard to be fully aware of what grows when. Buying food that is out of season pushes up its carbon footprint. For example British



tomatoes are available June to October-ish with Spain extending the season a little. But tomatoes bought outside this time will be grown in heated greenhouses and often then transported to the UK – with a huge carbon footprint. In addition they lack much flavour.

If you do grow some of your own food and would be willing to spend a little time sharing your experience

with someone else, could you let us know (email below). If you would like to learn more about growing your own fruit and vegetables, please let us know. We will try and match people up.

Much of our food depends on the use of fossil-fuels and chemicals for production and distribution. By buying organic, locally grown food, we not only lower the carbon footprint of food, but also ensure the food is fresh and healthy. One way of buying locally grown, seasonal food is to use a farmer's market. There is the possibility of one coming to Church Stretton every month if we can find enough willing volunteers to help put up and take down stalls. Please email if interested.

Our next meeting will be on Friday 6th May at 7:30 pm at Mike and Bev Turner's home (Linton, Bushmoor), focusing on energy usage. All welcome – shared lifts from the town centre.

THE BORDER PRAYER ROOM PROJECT

God has laid upon the hearts of a growing band of Christians across the ENGLISH/WELSH border a very specific time of PRAYER FOR OUR TWO NATIONS. Historically, England and Wales have been at war many times over the centuries, and even today resentments linger. But it is not to dwell upon that the Lord is calling us, but to reverse these wrongs by praying blessings upon one another.

The origins of THE BORDER PRAYER ROOM PROJECT came from pictures and words received by Yvonne Mason in May 2009. "I saw a map of the Welsh/English border. Running down the border was a line of stitches (rather like sutures), joining the two nations together. I heard the words "hands across the border", and came to understand that God was wanting the Border people of England and Wales to join together in a continuous prayer relay."
